



Gela Suladze was born in Tbilisi on February 20, 1959. After graduating from Tbilisi Gr. Kobakhidze School No. 77 (1976), he went on to the Georgian Polytechnic Institute Faculty of Electromechanics and Electronics (1981) and the USSR State Security Committee's Higher School (1986). He is a reserve colonel in the State Security Service, a writer, a security analyst, and a historian of special services.

He has written both fiction and documentaries, including "Loner - A Bright Soul" (2000), "Georgian Anti-Soviet Emigration and Special Services" (2010, 2012), "Lights and Shadows of the Recent History of Georgia Seen through the Eyes of Special Services" (2015), "Germans in Georgia and Their Fate in the Soviet Period" (2018), "The Assassination of the First Prime Minister of Georgia - Noe Ramishvili" (2018), "Applause, Boy, Datunika!" (2018) and "Where Are You, Karenchik?!"

He was awarded the Georgia State Prize for Science and Technology in 2004. He has received the Niko Nikoladze (2014), Davit Aghmashenebeli (King David the Builder) (2022), and Jemal Ajiashvili (2024) prizes from the Writers' Union of Georgia for his creative and public endeavours, as well as for writing the best prose works.

He was named an Honoured Artist of Georgian Culture (2019) for his many years of productive literary and public work, and he received the Certificate of the Association of Security Researchers (2022) for his contribution to documentary writing on security themes.

He has edited a number of books and served as a consultant on about ten documentaries. He is a member of the Creative Union of Writers in Georgia. He has a wife and two children.
